I have a prominent black or dark brown eye stripe.

I am always found near water.

I live along the West Coast of the United States.

I sing loudly in the day, and even louder at night.

I can usually be seen in shrubs or on the ground even though my name indicates I live in trees.

I hibernate in the coldest part of the year.

I belong to the HYLIDAE family. I have relatives in the Class Amphibia.

My face is always brown, but the rest of me varies from black to almost white.

I am usually nocturnal – out at night, but am sometimes seen in the daytime.

I am an omnivore eating everything, but I particularly like berries, nuts, and small insects.

My usually have two young who each weigh 7-12 ounce when they are born. They are born in the winter.

I usually travel alone unless I have my cubs with me.

I am the smallest species of my family.

I belong to the URSIDAE family.

I may be a solid color or have lots of spots.

I can fly, but my wings are usually not visible.

I eat insects like mites and aphids.

My name might make you think we are all females. Of course, this is not true.

I often spend the winter in a large group in a protected area.

I don't bite people so am a favorite to be held especially by children.

I belong to the COCCINELLIDE family.

I can live 30 or more years.

My voice is too high for humans to hear.

I eat flying insects such as mosquitoes.

I hang around in the daytime and am most active in the evening.

I belong to a group of animals whose name means hand-wing.

I belong to the Order Chiroptera (chi-ROP-ter-a).

I am usually found near water.

I come in different sizes – quite large to small.

My face, neck, legs and feet are black, and my cheeks are white.

In the summer, I usually live in a different place than I do during the winter.

My young are called goslings.

I belong in the ANATIDAE (a-KNAT-I dee) family.

I walk on four feet.

My nose is black.

My tail is all black. A close relative has an all white tail.

I am an herbivore. I enjoy eating from humans gardens when give the chance.

The spots on the backs of my young help them hide.

I belong to the CERVIDAE (SER-vi-dee) family.

I can move quickly, but I can't run.

I am a carnivore, eating small amphibians and reptiles.

I lay 2-9 eggs in the spring or early summer.

I live in different habitats in Eastern Washington.

I occasionally get to big for my own skin.

I am a member of the COLUBRIDAE (ko-LOU-bri-dee) family. Scientists just call me Hypsiglena (hi-SA-glena).

My tail is long and scaly.

I am the only mammal with 50 teeth.

I have an opposable toe on my back foot to help me climb.

I am an omnivore. I will eat almost anything.

I am the only marsupial in North America.

Scientists call me Didelphis (di-DEL-fis).
